Her holistic approach integrates expertise in sensory processing, neurological development, and evidence-based practices like Sensory Integration and Cranial Sacral Therapy. Sheena is SIPT-certified and continually pursues professional development to ensure high-quality, individualized care.

Presentation Title:

Supporting the Whole Child: Understanding Behavior, Sensory Needs, Trauma, and the Impact of Screen Time in the Montessori Environment

Presentation Description:

Montessori educators are uniquely positioned to observe, guide, and support the natural development of each child. However, in today's rapidly changing world, many children are arriving at school with nervous systems that are dysregulated due to trauma, sensory processing challenges, and increasing exposure to screen time. These factors can significantly impact emotional regulation, attention, and a child's ability to engage fully in even the most nurturing learning environments.

This workshop is designed to help Montessori educators better understand the root causes of challenging behaviors by exploring how trauma, sensory integration, and nervous system development are interconnected. We'll also examine how screen time—particularly when introduced early and used excessively—can alter a child's nervous system development, affecting sleep, social skills, attention, and overall emotional resilience.

Educators will gain insight into how motor and sensory play support healthy brain development and why these activities are essential for helping children regulate their emotions and behavior. Practical, sensory-based strategies will be shared to help de-escalate emotional reactions and create supportive, responsive classroom environments that align with Montessori principles.

This session is grounded in evidence-based research and aligns with Montessori values of respect, independence, and following the natural rhythm of the child.

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Presentation Title:

Explore from Squares to Square Root

Presentation Description:

The exploration of squares begins in Early Childhood and evolves through Upper Elementary, growing in both depth and complexity. Children first discover and define the square, then move on to drawing it and using it to create binomial and trinomial squares. This work is intuitive, engaging, and full of wonder. As students progress, they transition into working with larger squares, eventually constructing square root problems using the peg board. This hands-on, concrete journey through the concept of squaring sparks curiosity and supports the development of the mathematical mind, all through the rich, tactile experience of the Montessori materials.
